Truth and reconciliation

The Municipality of Jasper respectfully acknowledges that Jasper National Park and the Municipality of Jasper are on Treaty 6 and 8 Territories as well as Métis Region 4.

This land is the traditional territory, meeting ground, gathering place, travelling route and home for the Dane-zaa (Beaver), Nêhiyawak (Cree), Anishinaabe (Ojibway), Secwépemc (Shuswap), Stoney Nakoda and Métis.

Through the use of a territorial acknowledgement, the Municipality of Jasper:

- Honours the relationship between this land and the Indigenous Peoples that have been present and thrived in this area since time immemorial
- Acknowledges the past and ongoing impacts of the colonization of Indigenous Peoples and lands
- Recognizes the present-day relationship Indigenous Peoples have with this area
- Commits to ongoing reconciliation efforts in partnership with those whose Traditional Territory the Municipality of Jasper occupies

The Municipality of Jasper is learning about the rich and complex histories of Indigenous Peoples in this area. We are committed to acknowledging these histories in a truthful and authentic way. Our knowledge will continue to evolve over time as we engage in ongoing learning and education about reconciliation.

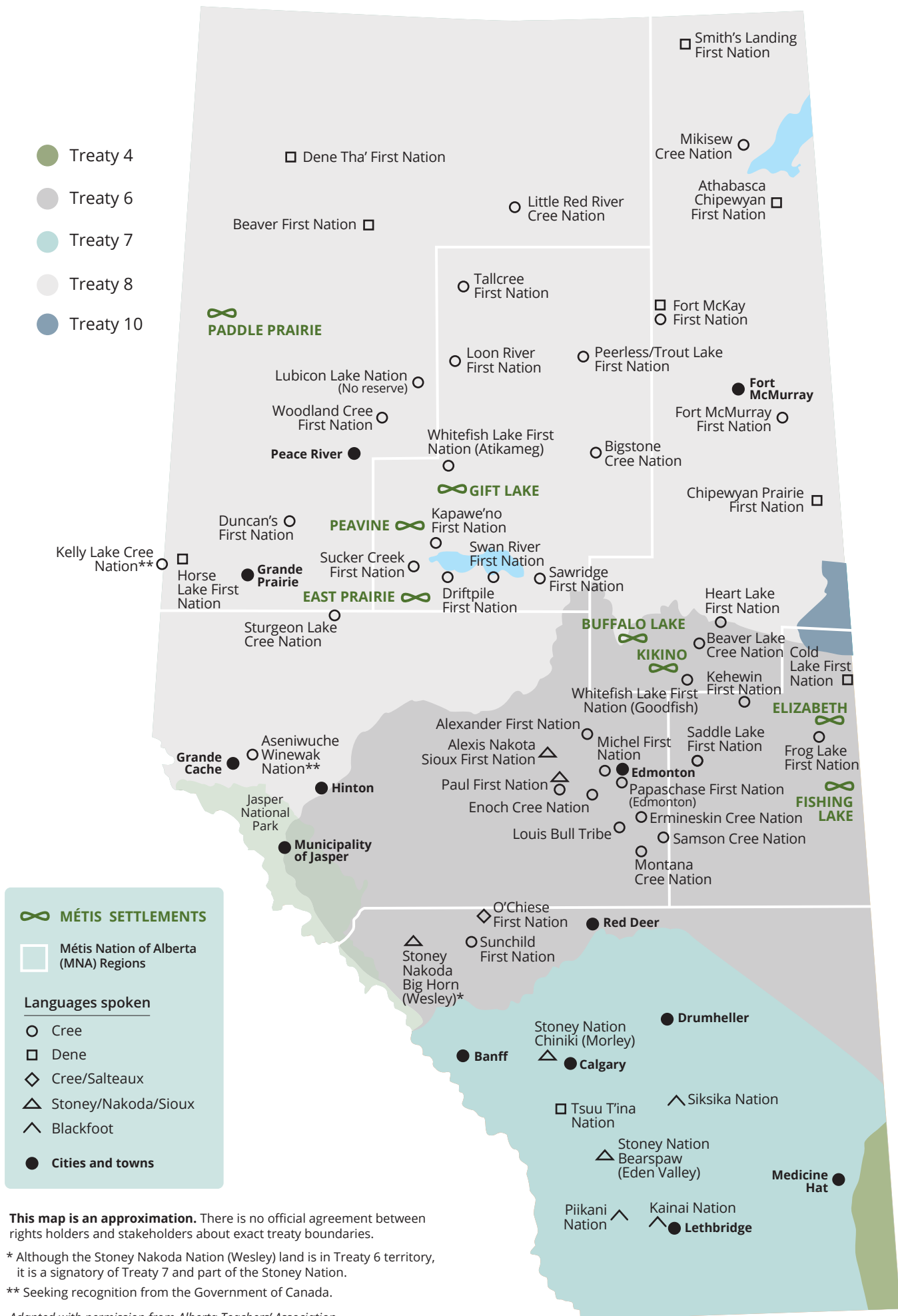

If your application is approved, a Health Care Card will be mailed to you. Most medical needs are covered under the insurance.

Documentation

Social Insurance Number

Your Social Insurance Number (SIN) is a unique nine-digit number assigned to you by the Government of Canada.

You must have a SIN number to work in Canada. You can also use a SIN number to access government programs and benefits.

All newcomers to Canada should apply for a SIN.

Identification (ID)

A driver's licence is the most commonly used and accepted piece of ID for Albertans. If you do not have a driver's licence, you can get an ID card through an Alberta registry office.

Driving

Bank accounts

To open a bank account, visit a local bank. Bring valid identification. You can use your passport or driver's licence.

You can open an account even if you:

- Don't have a job
- Don't have money to put in the account right away
- Have filed for bankruptcy

Schooling in Canada

Public education is free for all Canadian citizens and permanent residents in elementary, junior high and senior high public schools.

Canadians must attend school until the age of 16. There are four levels of education. Learn more about early learning and schools in Jasper on page 25.

Kindergarten

Kindergarten is the first stage of education in Canada and is for children between the ages of four and five. Kindergarten is not mandatory in Alberta.

Kindergarten helps socialize children into a classroom setting. There are simple activities such as counting, singing, colouring and games.

Junior Kindergarten and Kindergarten programs are available here at the Jasper Elementary School and École Desrochers. Read more on page 25.

Elementary

Elementary school in Canada is mandatory. Children start around the age of six or seven in Grade 1. Elementary school continues until Grade 7. Classes educate students on basic concepts with a focus on “hands-on” learning and creative projects.

Secondary

Secondary education in Canada has two levels: junior high school and high school.

In Jasper, junior high includes Grades 7 through 9. The goal of this stage is to help students prepare for the next step, where courses are more difficult.

High school is the last stage of secondary education. In Jasper, it starts in Grade 10, and continues into Grade 12 (ages 16 to 18, depending on the student).

Post-secondary education

After high school, students can apply to colleges and universities.

Post-secondary education in Canada is not free. Students must pay to attend college or university.

There are no post-secondary schools in Jasper.

Government

In Jasper, we are served by three levels of government.

Federal government

All of the provinces and territories are governed by the federal government.

The federal government is responsible for:

- Citizenship
- Passports
- Federal taxes
- Federal law
- National defence
- National parks (Parks Canada)
- The postal service

A Prime Minister of Canada and Parliament is democratically elected, usually every five years.

Provincial government

The Government of Alberta is responsible for:

- Education
- Social services
- Provincial law
- Hospitals
- Health care
- Provincial parks
- Highways

Alberta is divided into groups of voters in specific areas of the province. During a provincial election, the candidate in each of these areas (constituencies) who wins the highest number of votes becomes the Member of the Legislative Assembly (MLA) for that area (constituency).

The leader of the political party with the most winning candidates becomes the Premier of Alberta and leads the provincial government.

Local government

Our local government is the Municipality of Jasper. Local government is responsible for:

- Road clearing and maintenance
- Water supply
- Community centres
- Municipal taxes
- Making and enforcing bylaws
- Waste management

Legal system

Canada has a system of laws made by different levels of government. The laws apply to everyone.

Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms

The Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms guarantees your basic human rights and freedoms. You can find the Charter online or in our citizenship books.

Canadian police

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) are the official police service of Canada. Laws are enforced by the police, who must serve and protect all people equally.

Police in Canada are separate from the government and from the military. You can ask police officers for help in many situations.

The police service is responsible for:

- Protecting life and property
- Maintaining peace and order
- Preventing and investigating crime
- Enforcing municipal, provincial and federal laws

If you are arrested:

- Police officers will show you their badge (identification) and tell you who they are
- Police officers will tell you why you are being approached or arrested

You have the right to:

- Request to speak with a lawyer before sharing any information other than your name and address
- Ask the police officer to show you their identification
- Have a translator with you

About Jasper

Population

The last federal census was held in 2021. The population of year-round citizens in Jasper is around 4,700 people. The town sees up to 12,000 seasonal workers each year.

Typical weather

Weather in the mountains changes fast. Spring starts in May but there will be lots of snow on the mountains still. Summer starts in June, with long days.

Fall arrives in September, and it starts to cool down quickly. Winter can come as early as October or November. The long winter season can be very cold.

July is the warmest month in Jasper with an average temperature of 22 °C.

January is the coldest month with an average of -11 °C, although it can get colder than -30 °C.

Plants and animals

The town of Jasper is in a national park, so we need to take extra care to protect the plants, trees and shrubs that grow here naturally.



Before you plant a tree or shrub on your property, check out this list of trees and plants that work best for the park.

Jasper National Park is home to many wild animals such as elk, bighorn sheep, deer, bears, lynx and cougars. Give wild animals the space they need. You protect them when you don't approach or feed them.



History of the land

The present-day Municipality of Jasper is located on Treaty 6 and 8 Territories. For as long as we know, a diversity of Indigenous Peoples used this land as a meeting ground, gathering place, travelling route and home. Over 26 Indigenous partners remain connected to this area.

The first recorded European to visit the Athabasca Valley was Surveyor David Thompson in 1810. At this time and throughout the 1800s, Indigenous Peoples continued to care for the land while they provided valuable knowledge and guidance to European explorers and fur traders.

Creation of Jasper Forest Reserve

When Jasper Park Forest Reserve was created in 1907, Indigenous Peoples were forcibly removed and excluded from this part of their Traditional Territories. The land was used for European settler recreation and profit.

Following the removal of Indigenous Peoples, mountains, rivers and other parts of the landscape were renamed with settler colonial names.

Jasper townsite and tourism

The creation of the railway across Canada in the early 1900s led to more people settling in what we now call the Jasper townsite. Today, Jasper is a World Heritage Site with over 2 million visitors passing through the park gates each year.

The Municipality of Jasper is engaged in ongoing learning as we build relationships with Indigenous partners who are connected to these lands.

This brief overview of Jasper's history is a starting point as we continue to partner with Indigenous Peoples to tell the history of Jasper accurately and honestly.

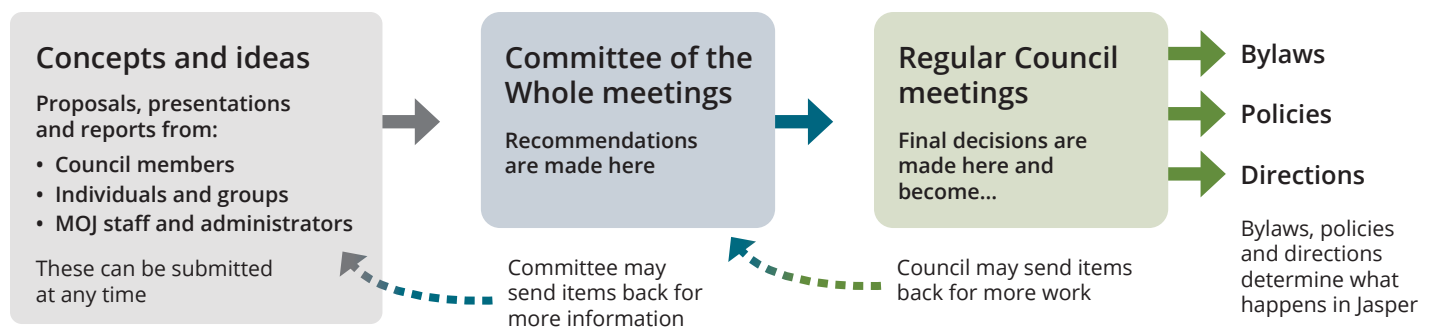


Local government

Important bylaws

Anti-idling

- Vehicles are not permitted to be idling. The fine for idling is \$ 100.
- Vehicles can idle long enough to defrost the windshield.
- Vehicles may idle if they are “working,” which includes emergency vehicles and refrigeration vehicles.

Conduct in public places

- Yelling, screaming profanities and fighting in a public place are not allowed.

Domestic animal

- Dogs and cats must have an annual licence.
- Dog waste must be picked up and disposed of.
- Dogs must be kept on a leash.
- Dogs cannot be a disturbance to others.

Noise

- You cannot disturb the peace of your neighbour.

Nuisance

- You cannot be a nuisance to your neighbours.
- Nuisance means any condition on property that is untidy, unsightly and dangerous to health or which interferes with the use or enjoyment of other lands.

Solid waste

- No illegal dumping is allowed. Illegal dumping includes leaving unwanted furniture by residential garbage bins.

Traffic

- Cyclists must obey the rules of the road.
- Cyclists cannot ride their bikes on the sidewalk, unless they are 12 years old or younger.
- Skateboarding and rollerblading are not permitted in the downtown core.

Cannabis consumption

- You cannot consume cannabis in any public place within the Municipality of Jasper.

Smoking control

- You cannot smoke in any business or outdoor patio.
- You cannot smoke in taxis or other forms of public transport.

Waste reduction

- Businesses and people are encouraged not to use plastic bags.

Camping

- You cannot camp on any land within the Municipality of Jasper.

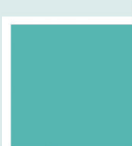

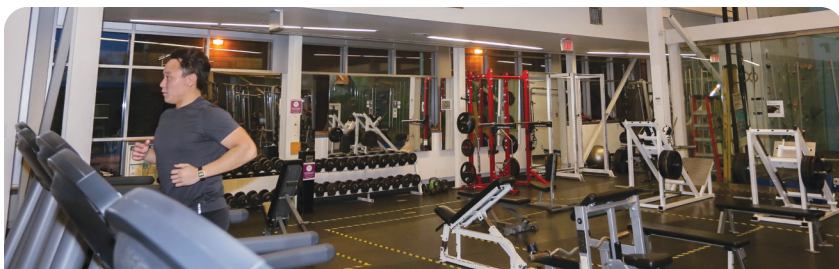

This trail wraps around the town of Jasper and has very little elevation gain until you get to the Bighorn Alley trail which heads east out of town towards the Maligne Lake road.

Trails on the Bench

The "Bench" is the large forested area on the North side of town. Various trailheads are along Bonhomme and Cabin Creek, and there are signs outlining the different trails you may walk. As a starter, Trail 3e from the Cabin Creek trailhead is a relaxed 2-km loop with a bit of elevation gain and nice views.

Old Fort Point

Hiking up Old Fort Point provides access to great views of town and the Icefields Parkway. If you're not up for the elevation gain, you can access other nice trails along the river from the Old Fort Point parking lot.

Lac Beauvert Loop

Lac Beauvert can be accessed from the Old Fort Point Road or from Jasper Park Lodge. The 5-km loop is relatively easy and has fantastic views.

Church Hill is popular spot for sledding. It is located at the corner of Bonhomme Street and Pyramid Lake Road. You can also go sledding at Centennial Park.

Skiing

Within town, you can cross-country ski at the school field and Centennial Park field.

There are also many cross-country ski trails a short drive from town like Whistler's Campground and Pyramid Lake Fire Road.

You can downhill ski at Marmot Basin, which is a half-hour drive from town.

Emergency information

Know the risks

From landslides to floods and wildfire, various disasters can affect the safety of residents in any community. In addition to natural disasters, other incidents such as power outages and transportation accidents may also affect you and your family.

In Jasper, the most likely risks to community safety include wildfires and toxic spills.

Wildfires

In recent years, mountain pine beetles have killed thousands of trees around Jasper, increasing the wildfire risk to our community.

In the event of a large wildfire, first responders will be busy fighting the fire. You should be ready to get out of Jasper and look after yourself and your family for at least 72 hours.

Toxic spills

Jasper has a major highway and a railway close to town. This means toxic materials may spill and cause a risk to public safety. If this happens, you may be directed to evacuate or shelter in place.



Jasper Emergency Services



Emergency planning

Disasters can happen with little or no warning. It's important to be prepared.

During a disaster, it may take emergency workers some time to reach you. You should be prepared to take care of yourself and your family for at least 72 hours.

Sign up for notifications

The Municipality of Jasper has an emergency alert system. Sign up to get emergency information and updates.

Make a plan

Get together with your family to work on your emergency plan. Make sure everyone understands what would happen and what to do. Remember to plan for your pets as well.

There is an emergency planning sheet at the back of this guide. You can also read the Jasper Evacuation Guide. Pick one up at the Activity Centre or at Community Outreach Services.

Get a kit

Put together an emergency kit and keep it somewhere easy to find. Make sure your kit is easy to carry and that everyone in the home knows where it is.

See the planning sheet at the back of this guide for a list of things for your kit.



In an emergency

- Follow your emergency plan
- Use your emergency kit
- Make sure you are safe before you help others
- Listen for emergency alerts
- Listen to radio and TV for more information
- Follow instructions from authorities

Depending on the type of emergency, you may be directed to evacuate or shelter in place.

Evacuations

The Municipality of Jasper may issue two kinds of evacuation notices. Know the difference.

Evacuation Alert

An Evacuation Alert tells people to prepare for an evacuation. If you are ready to go and can evacuate early, please do so.

Evacuation Order

An Evacuation Order tells people to evacuate immediately.

Shelter in place

In an emergency, you may be directed to shelter in place. This means the best way to protect yourself and your family is to stay indoors.

To shelter in place:

- Close and lock all windows and exterior doors
- If you are told there is a danger of explosion, close the window shades, blinds or curtains
- Turn off all fans, heating and air conditioning systems
- Close the fireplace damper
- Get your emergency kit
- Pick a small room inside your home with few or no windows and stay there

Keep listening for updates from local officials. Directions will vary depending on the situation.

Directions to shelter in place are usually provided for a few hours, not days or weeks.





Parking

It's easy to get around Jasper on foot or on a bicycle. If you are driving, there are lots of places to park.

Parking guidelines

- Vehicles must park facing the direction of travel
- Accessible stalls are available for valid permit holders
- You cannot park or stop by yellow curbs or cross-hatched white lines
- Some stalls are for buses or taxis only
- You cannot park where it obstructs traffic
- Recreational vehicles (RVs) longer than 7.5 metres may not park on the streets downtown. There is off-street parking for large RVs on the south side of Connaught Drive, past the train tracks just outside of town.

RV, trailer and commercial parking rentals

Jasper-based businesses can rent a stall by the month from the RV, trailer and commercial parking lot (not pictured on the map).

Fees:

- Stall length of 22 feet: \$150 +GST per month
- Stall length of 38 feet: \$200 +GST per month

Jasper-based businesses wishing to rent a stall must email Bylaw Enforcement Services.

All emails must contain contact details, make, model and dimensions of the equipment you wish to park.

You are not allowed to let your vehicle run unnecessarily in the Municipality of Jasper. This is called idling.

You may idle your vehicle to defrost the windshield. Once the windshield is clear, you must drive away or turn it off.

Roads and streets

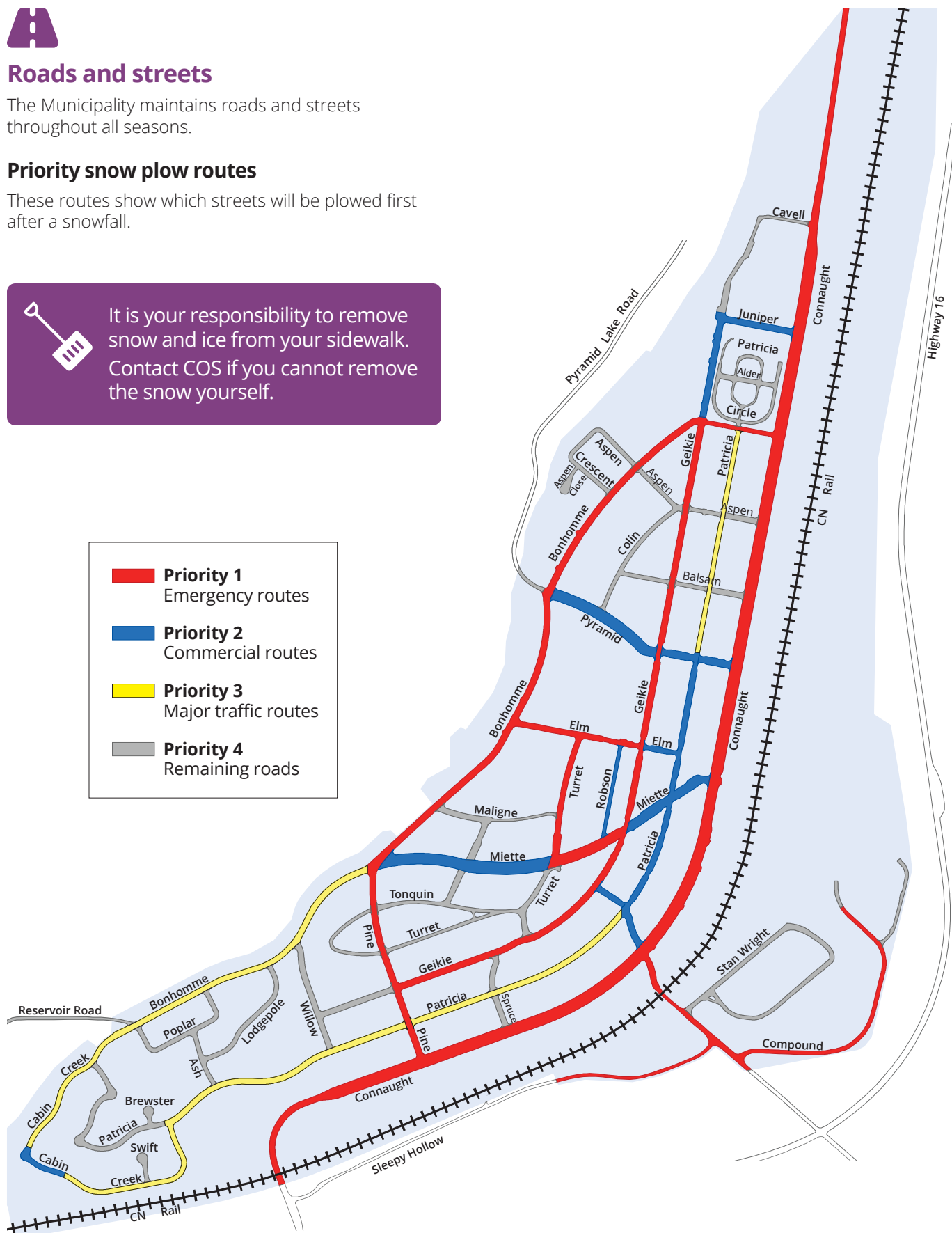
The Municipality maintains roads and streets throughout all seasons.

Fire department

The Jasper Fire Department has a full-time Fire Chief, Deputy Chief, Captain and Administrative Assistant. There are also 25 volunteer firefighters, making up the Jasper Volunteer Fire Brigade.

Jasper Volunteer Fire Brigade (JVFB)

The Jasper Volunteer Fire Brigade is a dedicated group of volunteers who provide the Jasper townsite and parts of Jasper National Park with firefighting and rescue services.

Response area

The Jasper Fire Department's response area includes the townsite and Jasper National Park.

Services provided

The Jasper Fire Department (JFD) responds to about 100 calls per year. Most of the calls are for motor vehicle incidents.

JFD also provides:

- Fire suppression
- Dangerous goods response
- Special rescue
- Fire inspection
- Fire investigation
- Wildland urban interface facility protection
- Critical incident stress management
- Fire prevention education
- Preschool to Grade 12 fire education
- Local business staff training
- Hotel fire safety courses
- Fire extinguisher training
- Community sponsorship
- SCUBA and SCBA breathing air refills

The fire department is also actively involved in emergency planning, fire prevention and safety.

Household waste

Jasper doesn't have individual household garbage collection. You need to find your neighbourhood waste bin and dispose of your household waste. The bins are colour-coded for different types of waste:

- Green is for compost
- Blue is for recycling
- Brown is for waste that cannot be composted or recycled

All waste bins in Jasper have special latches that keep animals out.



Composting

Kitchen compost bins are located beside most residential waste bins in Jasper.

Can be composted:

- Fruit and vegetable waste
- Egg shells
- Coffee grounds and filters

Cannot be composted:

- Meat and bone scraps
- Coal ash
- Grass and yard waste
- Compostable bags and containers
- Chemicals or cleaners
- Pet waste
- Plastic of any kind

Do not put any form of plastic in the compost bins.

Recycling

Jasper has two places where you can bring recycling:

- Activity Centre parking lot, Pyramid Lake Road
- S-Block in the Industrial Park

Find these locations on the map on the back page.

These items can be recycled:

- Glass and tin
- Mixed paper
- Cardboard
- Grass and yard waste
- Plastic
- Drinking containers
- Small batteries
- Bicycle tires (S-Block location only)

Commercial cardboard drop-off

Businesses can drop off commercial cardboard to be recycled at the Municipal Operations Building:

Monday to Friday between 1 p.m. and 3 p.m.

Please make sure boxes are flattened.

Beverage containers

There are beverage recycling bins in various locations around town. You can also drop off beverage containers to either recycling location.

The Jasper Bottle Depot is run by an independent business, separate from the Municipality of Jasper. You can return beverage containers for money at the bottle depot. It is located across the street from the S-Block recycling location.

Every beverage container has a refund of either 10 or 25 cents.

Evacuation Alert

An Evacuation Alert tells people to prepare for an evacuation. If you are ready to go and can evacuate early, please do so.

Evacuation Order

An Evacuation Order tells people to evacuate immediately. This may happen when there is little or no time to notify or following an Evacuation Alert.

Get a Kit

Put together an emergency go-kit and keep it somewhere easy to get if you have to evacuate. Keep your kit in a bag or tub and keep it light enough to be able to lift into your car. Keep enough gas in your tank to make it out at all times.

Things to take at the last minute:

- ☐ Glasses and contacts
- ☐ Medications
- ☐ Car Keys
- ☐ Cellphone and charger
- ☐ Wallet - ID, credit card, cash

Things to put in your emergency go-kit:

- ☐ Prescription record from your pharmacist
- ☐ Important documents (birth certificate, passport, insurance/bank records)
- ☐ First aid kit
- ☐ Extra set of car keys
- ☐ Battery-powered radio, extra batteries or a wind up radio
- ☐ Flashlights for each person
- ☐ Change of clothes for each person including warm clothes (hat, mittens)
- ☐ Six litres of water per person (include small bottles)
- ☐ Three-day supply of non-perishable food per person
- ☐ Pet food and water
- ☐ Copy of your emergency plan, include emergency contact numbers

Home Evacuation Due to Wildfire - Checklist

If time allows, follow these steps to protect your home from wildfire before an evacuation.

Inside the house:

- ☐ Remove window shades and curtains
- ☐ Move furniture away from windows and doors (if fire is a threat)
- ☐ Shut off gas at the meter and turn off pilot lights
- ☐ Shut off air conditioning
- ☐ Close metal shutters if you have them
- ☐ Shut all windows and doors, and lock the door when you leave

Outside the house:

- ☐ Turn off propane tanks
- ☐ Move propane barbecues away from buildings
- ☐ Move patio furniture away from building or put inside
- ☐ Don't leave sprinklers on or water running
- ☐ Connect garden hoses for use by firefighters
- ☐ Turn exterior lights on
